A NOTE FROM OUR CO-FOUNDERS

Dear Friends,

Here we are, together-apart, for our 6th annual festival: Untold Voices in Voting. THANK YOU for sharing this virtual space with us and embracing a new theatrical experience.

We, as people, are hungry for the arts to enrich our lives in uncertain times. Perhaps uncertain is inaccurate --- this is a terrifying time and for those living through chaos, pain and fear --- we see you! We also see an inspiring show of strength, empathy, boldness, allyship, and solidarity in our community and world. Over the past months, there have been many unknowns, but we knew that the 2020 festival had to happen. We knew that we must Amplify Untold Voices. We knew that we must commemorate the centennial of the 19th amendment in this critical election year. So, here we are, thanks to you, our friends/patrons/donors, continuing to create opportunities for women+ in theatre and making our best efforts to uplift and employ artists at a time when our theatres are shuttered.

This year, as we celebrate 100 years since the ratification of the 19th amendment, we are unpacking women's suffrage in America --- what was accomplished, what failed, and what is still to be done. When thinking about our own understanding of women's suffrage, we acknowledge it was shaped through the narrow, white, upper-middle class lens of Abigail Adams, Elizabeth Cady Stanton and Susan B. Anthony. We wanted to know more about the universal fight of women's suffrage led by BIPOC (Black, Indigenous, People of Color) suffragists and bring this history to you. Although women were granted the right to vote in 1920, Black women remained disenfranchised until the Voting Acts Right of 1965. Today, Black, Latinx, and Native American people are plagued by different barriers to exercising their right to vote including voter ID rules, gerrymandering, and more. We invite you to #AmplifyUntoldVoices with us, particularly women+ of color, who were left out of the narrative of the suffrage movement. To commemorate these voices and explore their relevance today, we have had the great fortune to partner with Jouska PlayWorks, an assembly of playwrights of color.

Together, we bring you Untold Voices in Voting to celebrate the voices of Fanny Lou Hamer, Ida B. Wells, Angeline Welde Grimke, Frances Harper, Sojourner Truth, and countless other women of color who fought relentlessly against injustice.

This is our first go at Zoom theatre so expect the unexpected and thank you for journeying with us! Get cozy on your couch (date night? Dinner and a movie?), wear your pajamas (or not) and revel in the fact that parking was free and you didn't hit traffic (I know we aren't the only ones who have refilled the meter at intermission). Thank you for joining us for an intersectional celebration of women's rights activists ---without leaving home!

Ang Bey is a black, queer storyteller from Southwest Philadelphia. They are an award-winning actor and playwright, whose work as an artist is inseparable from their activism. Ang's play, *Com[promising] Freedom* won the National Constitution Center's

Founding Freedom's contest and was produced by NCC in 2015. *The Medusa Play*, by Ang, was recently Barrymore Recommended and produced by Shoe Box Theatre Collective. The academic production of *The Medusa Play* at Ursinus College marked the first time in the history Ursinus that a black student had a play produced on the main stage. Other works including *The Guardian* (Winner of Episcopal Academy Play Slam), *Pedestals* (Philadelphia Young Playwrights Monologue Festival), and *Twenty Six* have garnered regional acclaim. Currently, Ang is in the inaugural cohort of Jouska PlayWorks with Simpatico Theatre Company. They are the Season Apprentice at Theatre Horizon. They earned a Theater B.A. Africana Studies minor from Ursinus in May 2019. angbey.com
